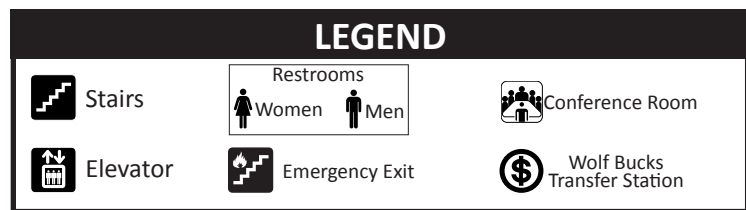
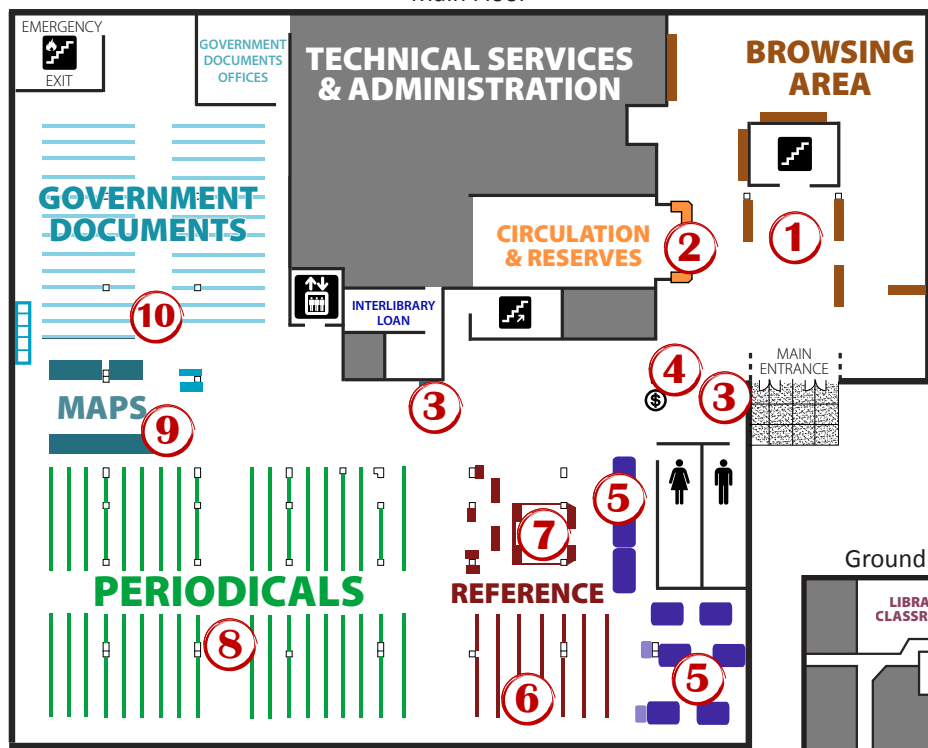


## Main Floor



## MAIN FLOOR

- 1 The *Browsing Area* contains new books and periodical issues, top picks, and movies.
- 2 Visit the *Circulation Desk* to check out materials, retrieve items placed on *reserve*, and pay fines.
- 3 *Photocopiers* are located here for your convenience.
- 4 Use this *Transfer Station* to add money to your ID Card to enable copying and printing while inside the library.
- 5 These *computers* provide access to databases and the Internet. Selected workstations contain the full Microsoft Office software suite. These require you to provide your MyUWG username and password.
- 6 The *Reference Stacks* contain encyclopedias, dictionaries, and other useful materials.
- 7 The *Reference Desk* is the place to go for research assistance.

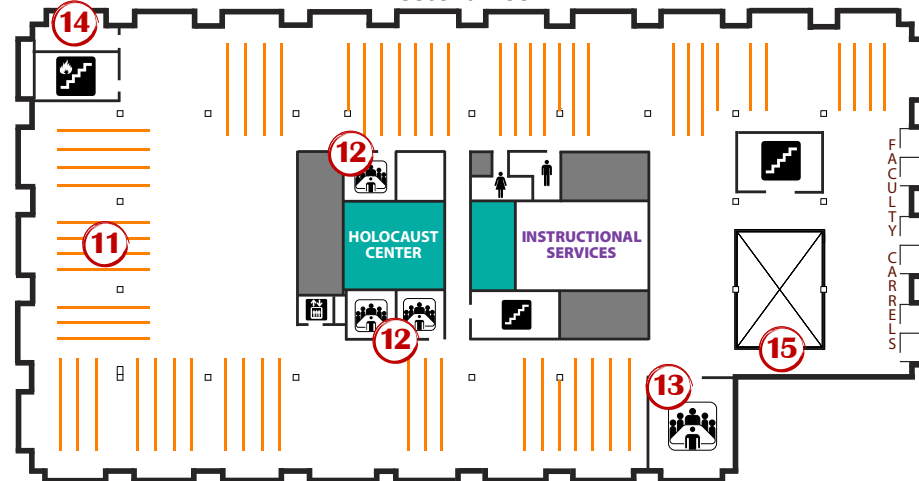
A friendly staff member is available to answer your research questions during normal hours.

- 8 The *Periodical shelves* contain back issues of journals and magazines arranged alphabetically by title.
- 9 A variety of maps are stored in the *Map Area* (USGS topographic, Bureau of Land Management surface and minerals, and more).
- 10 The *Government Documents* collection contains official publications from the United States Government.

## SECOND FLOOR

- 11 The *Main Stacks* on this floor contain materials beginning with LC call numbers A – K.
- 12 Several *Conference Rooms* are available for group study. Check out a key from the *Circulation Desk*. *Note: Rooms also on Third Floor.*

- 13 The *Main Conference Room* is used for library functions and by faculty and staff for official meetings.
- 14 The *Visual Lab* is provided for visually disabled students. To check out the key, you must be on the approved list from Dr. Ann Phillips' office in Student Development.

## THIRD FLOOR

- 16 The *Main Stacks* on this floor contain materials beginning with LC call numbers L – Z.
- 17 *Special Collections* contains University Archives, manuscripts, rare books, and donated collections.
- 18 The Juvenile Book Collection
- 19 The Hooks Collection, donated by the family of David Hooks, are books primarily on parapsychology.

## About Ingram Library

The Library and its web site provide access to information resources, including books, journals, online materials, maps, government documents, newspapers and recorded material in CD, video and DVD formats. Library collections include nearly 400,000 cataloged volumes, over 1,000,000 microforms, more than 20,000 maps and charts, as well as audiovisual items and archival materials. The Library provides access to some 16,000 print and electronic serials, including magazines, scholarly journals and newspapers, and an extensive array of online databases and research tools to facilitate access to materials.
